# A prayer to say together

Dear God,

Thank you for the story of Peter's Gospel Message, when Peter boldly shared the Good News about your love and Jesus' sacrifice for us.

Help us to be bold carriers of your Gospel message today, sharing your love and the Good News about Jesus with everybody we meet.

We pray for all those who don't yet know you that they would hear the Good News about Jesus and come to know you as their friend and saviour.

Amen

#### Discussion

A question for adults to ask children Who did Peter say his message was for?

In verse 39 Peter said "This promise is for you, for your children, and for all who are far away. It is for everyone the Lord our God calls to himself." Remember what had just happened at Pentecost, the Holy Spirit had arrived and the disciples had spoken in many languages.

Before this point God had spoken and guided the Jewish people, you can read their story throughout the Old Testament. But God wanted <u>everybody</u> in the world to know that his love was for them and forever! Jesus had instructed his followers to share the Good News about God's love throughout the world.

A question for children to ask adults
What does the Good News mean to you?

# Family Activity 1

You will need: Scarves, a timer

Peter quoted from one of David's Psalms when he spoke at Pentecost.

'I keep the Lord before me always.

Because he is close by my side,


I will not be hurt."

Psalm 16 v 8

Have a family three-legged race. Use a scarf to tie two people together by the ankle, then make them complete the course. If you have space, have a race across a room or garden. If you have an odd number of people in your family, you can take it in turns and time how long each pair takes.

If you have limited space, why not set yourself a challenge of an activity of route around the house to complete whilst connected together.

How great that God is always close by our sides, protecting and supporting us.





Matthew 28 v 18-20

"All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. **Therefore go and make disciples of all nations**, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

Our verse to remember today is actually three verses long, it is known as the 'Great Commission' and was Jesus' instructions to his disciples about how to continue the work he had begun on the earth.

Try to learn this verse together, you could come up with some actions to help you remember it . Why not decorate the verse on a piece of paper or card together and put it up somewhere to remind you of it through the week?

# Family Activity 2

You will need: A calculator (or a maths genius!)

At Pentecost, 3000 people heard the Good News and decided to live for God. That is a BIG number. Go around your house and find items to count. You might count... how many spoons you have, how many pairs of socks, how many biscuits in a packet. Using your calculator divide 3000 by the number of the item you have.

E.g. I have 15 pairs of socks in my drawer (that is 30 socks) -  $3000 \div 30 = 100$ .

That means I would need to have 100 TIMES MORE socks to give one to each person who was saved at Pentecost – or 200 TIMES MORE if I wanted to give each person a pair!

Wow! When you think like that it really gives you an idea of the big numbers involved.

# Helping Older Children

The idea of sharing the Good News with others can be daunting. Older children might worry what friends will think of them if they openly share their faith. Others might be concerned about the idea of public speaking.

Our own choices and the way we live and share God's love can be the starting point for a conversation. Why not pray that friends would see something different in you and begin to ask questions?

Those nervous about having the right words or speaking publicly might be encouraged by the story of Moses – God equipped him and gave him a friend in Aaron who could help him speak when he needed to.

# **Active Prayer**


You will need: paper, pens


Write or draw on the paper your own explanation of the Good News – it could include the story of Easter, a testimony or an encouraging Bible Verse. You could even set it out like your own newspaper.

Pray that the Good News would bless and encourage whoever reads it.

Post or deliver your Good News to somebody who you would like to share God's love and encouragement with.

# Bible Passage

Today we will be exploring together, the story of the Early Church.

You can find it in your Bible in:

#### Acts 2 v 42-47

Read the story together – choose a Bible translation or children's story version which best suits your group.



#### Discussion

A question for adults to ask children
What similarities can you find between the early church and
the church today?

Just like in the days of the first church we are meeting together in our homes on a Sunday although nowadays we are doing it online! We still spend time learning and listening to teaching, we pray together and take communion together.

The first believers shared everything they had including their money, possessions, food and land. They gave to those in need and shared the good news about Jesus with everybody they met. What sort of things can you see your church doing to help and serve others?

A question for children to ask adults
What is your favourite thing about church?

# A prayer to say together

Dear God,

Thank you, the example of the early church who gave everything, to help and serve one another and you. Thank you that we can still learn from their example today.

We thank you for all those who are working to make sure that we can still be church together in our homes. We pray for all those leading churches around the world that you would give them strength and wisdom as they make decisions.

We pray that just like the early church we would see new members added to our own church communities. Amen

#### Family Activity 1 - based on Acts 2 v44

"All the believers were together and shared everything"

#### You will need:

A pile of rice – or something to use as counters. e.g. buttons, coins etc. A timer (you can use your phone)

Set yourselves a sharing challenge – give each person a small pile of rice, they do not have to be equal (in fact it is better if they are not) Give yourselves one minute on the timer to try and share out your pile of rice equally so everybody has the same amount at the end.

Once everybody has had a go, push all the piles together and work as a team to divide it up equally.

You could use this activity to discuss how our giving and sharing in church works, we all have different amounts we can contribute but by sharing what we have we can make sure that everybody has something.



#### Acts 2 v 46

"They ate together in their homes, happy to share their food with joyful hearts."

Try to learn this verse together, you could come up with some actions to help you remember it or decorate the verse on a piece of paper or card together and put it up somewhere to remind you of it through the week. Why not recite it together before meals asking God to keep your hearts joyful in difficult times.

#### Family Activity 2 - based on Acts 2 v47

"They praised God and were liked by all the people"

You will need: Music

Play a game of 'Musical Compliments' – when the music plays everybody should dance around. When the music stops, everybody should compliment somebody else in the room and tell them something they like about them.

"Feels Good (Upbeat song)" by Rend Collective Kids is a great song to use – it is all about how good it feels to be together.

# Helping children think about giving

Why not encourage your children to think about how they can give and share what they have.

Now is a great time to sort through old books, toys or clothes and think about who they could pass them on to or share them with.

It is good to help children think about tithing as well. If your child receives pocket money why not make sure they receive it in a form that makes it easy to set some aside for God. e.g. If your child receives £2 make sure it is made up of change including a 20p that they can set to one side.

# Active Prayer


Share a prayer...

The early church shared <u>everything</u>, why not try sharing a prayer together. One person begins by saying a word e.g. Dear and the next person says the next word of the prayer e.g. God. Take it in turns to add one word at a time to your prayer. The prayer finishes when somebody adds the word Amen.

Thank you for the story of Peter healing the man who was lame. Thank you that just like Peter we have your authority and power on earth through the Holy Spirit.

Help us to be carriers of your presence in the world and sharers of the Good News about your love and the death and resurrection of Jesus.

We pray for healing for all those in the world who are fighting the coronavirus. We pray that they would know you as their healer but also as their saviour and friend.

Amen

#### Discussion

#### A question for adults to ask children

Peter had spent three years watching Jesus – what similarities can you see between what Peter did in the story and what Jesus did?

Just like Jesus, Peter showed love for those around him, Jesus healed those who came to him when he was on the earth, he cared for and loved those around him. Not only did Peter listen to the man and show compassion to him, he used the heavenly power he had through Jesus and the Holy Spirit to declare healing for the man.

Just like Jesus when in front of a large group, Peter took the opportunity to share about God's love and preached the gospel to all those around him.

#### A question for children to ask adults

Can you think of a time when you were able to pray for somebody else who was sick or in need?

# Family Activity 1 - based on Acts 2 v44 "Read all about it!"

You will need: Paper, pens, any other craft materials you would like to use.

Design your own family newspaper front page! Share the news of the miraculous healing of the lame man in the story. How do you think it might have been reported at the time?

Perhaps you could draw your own pictures of what it might have looked like or imagine an interview with the lame man who had been healed.

DAILY NEWS

Just like Peter we are to be carriers of God's good news today!



#### 1 John 2 v 6

"Whoever says that he lives in God must live as Jesus lived."

Just like Peter we can live as Jesus lived on the earth and share God's love with others. Can you learn this verse together?

You could come up with some actions to help you remember it or decorate the verse on a piece of paper or card together and put it up somewhere to remind you of it through the week.

# Family Activity 2 Musical Bumps

The man in the story had never walked in his life, but after he was healed, he went 'walking and jumping and praising God.' Play a game of musical bumps together, start sitting on the floor – when the music plays everybody jumps up and dances around – when the music is paused everybody sits



# Helping Older Children

Older children might question how the man in the story was healed instantly but so many are struggling with illness in our world.

Remind them that just like at Pentecost the Holy Spirit is available to us and we have the power to pray and ask for healing for others.

God always hears our prayers but he does not always answer them instantly. We have to trust in God and his love for us.

The world we live in is not the one that God had planned for us – the injustice, sickness and struggle in our world are the result of sin. We live in a broken world but we can pray that God's Kingdom would Come.

### Active Prayer

You will need: Paper, pens, a timer

Peter and John were some of the first Christians, they
were still exploring what it meant to be church together.

What might they have made of our churches
today?

Take some time to pray for as many people as you can from your own church.

Set the timer for a few minutes, everybody should write down as many names of people from your church as they can think of.




Then set the timer again, this time, your challenge is to pray for all of the people you have written down. Put a tick by them as you pray...don't miss anybody out!



# A prayer to say together

Dear God,

Thank you for the story the early church, thank you that we can read about the amazing things they experienced but also the challenges.

Help us to look out for those who are not being treated fairly or equally. Show us where there are people who need help and support. Give us wisdom to make good decisions so that we can help others.

Thank you for all our food banks that are helping those in need during these difficult times.

Amen

#### Discussion

#### A question for adults to ask children

Who was being treated unfairly in the story? How does it make you feel when you are not treated fairly?

In the story the Greek-speaking widows complained, they said that they were not getting a fair share of the food that was being given out each day.

It can be very upsetting or even make us feel angry if we are being left out or treated differently from others. God loves justice – that means everybody being treated fairly, so he feels upset and angry when situations are not fair for everybody. As God's church we can play a part in sharing with others and treating all those we meet fairly, sharing God's love equally with everybody. We can play a part in making sure nobody feels they are treated differently because of how they look or where they come from.

#### A question for children to ask adults

What do we do as a church to help those in need?

#### Family Activity 1

You will need: a game that you can all play together

Play a game together, it could be a board game you enjoy or any fun game that everybody can understand and join in with.

Before you begin think about what makes the game fair and makes sure that everybody has an equal chance of winning. If one person has an advantage or disadvantage is there something you can do to 'level the playing field'?

Encourage everybody to celebrate, whoever wins – this is easier when you know that you had an equal chance of winning.





#### Micah 6 v 8

"The Lord has told you, human, what is good; he has told you what he wants from you: to do what is right to other people, love being kind to others, and live humbly, obeying your God."

Just like the widows in the story, God does not want us to remain quiet in the face of injustice. Just like the early church in the story God wants us to actively seek solutions and change. Can you learn this verse together? You could come up with some actions to help you remember it or decorate the verse on a piece of paper or card together and put it up somewhere to remind you of it through the week.

# Family Activity 2

Play a game of 'follow the leader' – the disciples recognised that they needed to put the right people in charge of managing the food so that it was shared out fairly. Leaders are people who set a good example for others to follow, who look out for everybody and make sure everything is done fairly.

Take it in turns to be the leader that everybody must follow – encourage the leader to choose actions or movements that everybody is able to follow, that are not too difficult or too fast for others to follow.



## Helping Older Children

The world is full of hurting and angry people at the moment crying out for Justice. The story of the widows is one of injustice – but the church took action to make sure that everybody was treated fairly and equally.

You could use this story as a starting point for a conversation about Justice. Our God is a God of Justice – and God's love, mercy and provision are for all. He hears our cries, our prayers and our thirst for Justice in this time as well.

Just as the early church sought to bring Justice into the situation we have a role to play in seeking Justice in our world today.

### Active Prayer


In a time when many are struggling to provide for themselves and their families it is good to pray to our God of provision. Just as there are many stories in the Bible of God multiplying food and providing for others why not pray while you prepare or eat food and ask God for his provision for your family and for those in your community.


Why not actively seek to share from your own provisions

with those around you – drop off a meal for a neighbour, share some baked goods with another family, buy some extra goods and donate them to the foodbank.

# A prayer to say together

Dear God,

Thank you for the story of Stephen, who lived for you and spoke boldly when asked about his faith.

We remember all those around the world who live in countries where it is not safe to be a Christian. We pray for your protection over their lives but that they would have opportunities to share their faith with others too.

Help us to be bold in sharing our faith and to live for you just as Stephen did.

Amen

#### Discussion

A question for adults to ask children
Why did the people in the story tell lies about Stephen?

The elders and teachers of the law were unhappy with Stephen – they could not win arguments against him because the Holy Spirit had given him the ability to speak with great wisdom and confidence.

It probably made the religious leaders feel embarrassed in public when they lost an argument. They did not want more people to join the new church and follow Jesus. They were probably scared of losing their power.

A question for children to ask adults
Can you think of a time when you shared your faith with
somebody?

Don't worry if the person was not interested or rejected you. Just like Stephen people might be negative, angry or confused by the Good News of Jesus. All we can do is keep praying for those who do not yet know Jesus and trust in God's timing.

# Family Activity 1

The High Priest asked Stephen:

#### "Are these things true?"

and Stephen knew the scripture so well he was able to give examples from throughout the Old Testament of those who brought messages from God but were rejected by God's people. Play a true or false quiz to see who knows their Bible best.

There is a list of questions on page 3 – (the answers are at the bottom) – play a game of true or false – if you think the answer is true then stand up but if you think it is false sit down.

Who can score the most points?





#### 1 Peter 3 v 15

"Always be ready to answer everyone who asks you to explain about the hope you have."

Try to learn this verse together, you could come up with some actions to help you remember it. Why not decorate the verse on a piece of paper or card together and put it up somewhere to remind you of it through the week?



### Helping Older Children

Sharing our faith with others can be a challenge particularly when the response we receive might be negative. It is however part of the commission we have been given.

Why not help older children to think and talk through how they might share the Good News about Jesus with others?

Colour books are a simple way to share the Gospel, why not make one together. You will need to find or colour paper in the following colours.

**Black** – represents sin, the mistakes we have all made.

**Red** – represents the blood of Jesus, shed for us.

While – reminds us that we are washed clean by Jesus' sacrifice for us.

Yellow/Gold – represents the promise of eternal life and heaven for all those who hear and respond to the Good News.

Green – reminds us that we can all continue to grow in faith and learn more about God.



# Family Activity 2

In our story today people picked up stones to attack Stephen, it was a horrible way to react. Stones appear throughout the Bible – in the Old Testament they were used to build altars as a reminder of good things God had done, the word of God is described as being like a firm rock we can build our lives on.

Many people are decorating and hiding rocks to encourage other families in their communities. Why not decorate some rocks together and think about how God can use anything for his glory even when people try to use things for destruction.





#### Discussion

A question for adults to ask children
Where did the verses that the Ethiopian man in the story was
reading, come from?

The man in the story was reading from the book of Isaiah in the Old Testament. Isaiah is one of the Prophecy books in the Bible, God spoke to Isaiah and told him to write down a message for his people. The message spoke about a saviour who would come and take a punishment that he didn't deserve. Philip knew that this message was speaking about Jesus.

In fact there are many verses in the Old Testament which told people about Jesus – they spoke about who he was and what would happen to him, God's plan to make a way for our sins to be forgiven is spoken about throughout the books of the Old Testament.

A question for children to ask adults What is your favourite verse from the Bible?

#### Family Activity 1

**You will need:** Lego or other plastic figures (or something to represent the people in the story), any packaging/junk modelling materials you can find.

Create your own dramatic retelling of the story using items from around the house – why not craft your own chariot for the Ethiopian to ride in, set up a bowl of water for the baptism to take place in.

Use some waterproof toys or figurines to represent the characters. You could share out the roles getting different family members to voice the characters. Why not film your finished story and share it with another family?





#### Luke 2 v 10-11

The angel said to them, "Do not be afraid. I am bringing you good news that will be a great joy to all the people. Today your Saviour was born in the town of David. He is Christ, the Lord."

This is a verse we normally think about at Christmas, but it is a great reminder that Jesus was the promised Saviour and that his good news was for all people! Try to learn this verse together, you could come up with some actions to help you remember it or decorate the verse on a piece of paper or card together and put it up somewhere to remind you of it through the week.

You will need: A Bible (or two)! A timer



- **E EXAMPLE** Is there an example to follow in the passage?
- **C COMMAND** Is there a command of God to obey in the passage?
- K KNOWLEDGE What knowledge can I draw from this passage about God and about me?





#### Discussion

#### A question for adults to ask children

Where was Saul travelling at the beginning of the story and why?

Saul was travelling to Damascus on a mission – he wanted to arrest and take back to Jerusalem anybody he found who was following Jesus and was part of the new Christian church.

Saul had made it his personal mission to persecute and attack all those who were saying that Jesus was the son of God and had died on the cross and risen from the dead. But Jesus had a plan for Saul – he wanted Saul to know that his sacrifice on the cross had been for everybody. Jesus had a new mission for Saul, to spread his Good News to everybody. Saul was also known by the name Paul and you can read his letters of instruction to many churches throughout the New Testament.

#### A question for children to ask adults

How did becoming a Christian change you?

# Family Activity 1

Saul was blinded, he had to trust others to guide him where he needed to go. The people who were with Saul took him by the hand and led him to Damascus.

Set up an obstacle course, blindfold somebody and then guide them through the course using just instructions or the sound of your voice. You could talk about how it feels having to trust somebody else to guide you and share how Saul must have felt.



#### Matthew 5 v 44

"But I tell you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you."

These words come from Jesus' famous 'Sermon on the Mount' where he gave instructions on how to live right for God. We often focus on Saul in this Bible story, but we can learn from the example of Ananias as well.

Can you learn this verse together? You could come up with some actions to help you remember it or decorate the verse on a piece of paper or card together and put it up somewhere to remind you of it



# Family Activity 2

You will need – a tray of random items from around the house, a towel or scarf

Lay a range of items from around your house on a tray or table, give everybody 1 minute (or less) to memorise as many objects as they can. Cover over the objects with the towel and remove one item, but make sure nobody can see what you have taken.

Who can be first to work out which item is missing? Take it in turns to be the person who removes an item and see who can get the most points.

What a change people must have seen in Saul after his encounter with Jesus on the Damascus Road, his behaviour changed overnight. Why not use this game to think about how being a follower of Jesus changes the way we live our lives.


You will need: Paper, Pens

Use these steps to make a paper aeroplane.


Before you fold your paper you might want to write or draw on it any mistakes from your past that you would like to say sorry to God for.

#### Discussion

A question for adults to ask children

How many times did Peter see the vision? Why didn't he want to eat the food?

Peter saw the vision of the sheet three times, each time he refused to eat the food because it was unholy according to the Old Testament Jewish laws. Under the old laws if somebody broke a law or did something to make themselves unclean they had to go to a priest and make a sacrifice to ask for forgiveness.

But when Jesus came and died, he made a sacrifice so that all the sins of the world could be forgiven forever. We can go direct to God and say sorry.

I wonder if God chose to show the vision to Peter three times to remind him of the three times that Jesus asked Peter "Do you love me?" before he returned to heaven. You can find the story in John 21 and see what instructions Jesus gave to Peter.

A question for children to ask adults

Can you think of a time when you had to change your behaviour or viewpoint for God?

# Family Activity 1

"Go with them without doubting, because I have sent them to you."



Peter was told to follow the three strangers who had come to visit Him. He was told to do so without doubting.

Play a game of 'Follow the Leader' take it in turns to be the Leader – where will you make everybody follow you to? How will you travel? Hopping? Jumping? Backwards?

Think about how it felt for Peter following the strangers without knowing where they were taking him.

# Family Activity 2

Peter realised that "In every country God accepts anyone who worships him and does what is right."



Go to the place in your kitchen where you keep your food. Read the labels on the food to find out where the food was grown and has come from.

Pray together for each of the countries that you discover!

### Helping Older Children

Peter had to overcome his own prejudices and biases against those who weren't Jewish. The news at the moment is full of stories of violence and disagreements around the world many of them can be traced back to the prejudice and bias of people who see the differences in others and not the similarities.

Older children may have heard these news stories or talked with friends about them and will have questions about global inequality.


Peter's story challenges us to examine our own hearts and look for prejudice or bias in how we live day to day.

Don't be afraid to discuss these difficult topics, always returning to the truth expressed by Peter... "I really understand now that to God every person is the same."

God's love and the sacrifice of Jesus are available to everybody equally.

It is right for us to be angered or upset by the injustice we see in the world – this is how God feels when he sees the fallen and sinful world that we live in. The world is not how God created it to be.



#### Discussion

#### A question for adults to ask children

How many miraculous things can you find in the story?

Wow! What an incredible story – full of miraculous things. Peter was in prison, they were obviously so worried about him escaping that they had tied him up between two soldiers and there were more soldiers outside! How amazing that none of the soldiers were aware of Peter's dramatic escape!

The arrival of an angel in his prison cell was so miraculous that even Peter wasn't sure if he was awake! Chains fell off, gates opened and soldiers just let Peter and the angel walk from the prison.

No wonder Rhoda was so excited that she forgot to open the door and no wonder nobody believed her story!

#### A question for children to ask adults

Can you think of a time when you prayed a big miracleseeking prayer?


#### Family Activity 1

You will need: strips of paper, tape or glue

Have a paper chain race – working individually or in teams set a timer and see who can make the longest paper chain in one minute. If you are working on your own you might want to set the timer for two minutes or more.

Form a paper loop with one strip of paper, then pass another strip through your loop before gluing or sticking it into a complete circle. Keep doing this with strips until the timer runs out. Count how many loops are in each chain to see who has won.

You will need: a piece of paper roughly the size of a postcard, scissors.


All things are possible to God, even things which are impossible to man. Can your whole family climb through a piece of paper? It might seem impossible but follow these instructions and it can be done.

- Fold your piece of paper in half long ways.
- Make cuts out from the folded edge towards the open edge of the paper, do not cut all the way to the edge.

- Cut along the fold between these two outermost cuts.
- Unfold your paper and it should form a ring big enough to step through.
- The narrower the spaces between the cuts the larger the ring.

# **Active Prayer**



#### Discussion

#### A question for adults to ask children

Where did the sailors think they were travelling in the boat?
What did Paul say would happen?

Paul was being taken to Italy to meet with Caesar, he was under arrest for sharing the Good News about Jesus. The sailors were taking Paul and some other prisoners to Rome.

Paul had a message from God that he would have the chance to speak before Caesar but he also knew that the journey would not be a simple one. When the storms came and the sailors were afraid it was Paul that reassured them, he knew that even though a shipwreck was on the horizon God had promised that nobody would be harmed.

What an amazing testimony of how God was looking after Paul.

#### A question for children to ask adults

What is a journey you have been on where you knew that God was with you?

# Family Activity 1

You will need: Any craft materials you have round the house, glue, paper in blue colours

Make a stormy collage using any blue/green craft materials you have around the house. You could include a boat in your collage like the one in the story.







#### Isaiah 43 v 2

"When you pass through the waters, I will be with you.

When you cross rivers, you will not drown.

When you walk through fire, you will not be burned,

nor will the flames hurt you."

These words from Isaiah remind us that even in the most challenging times God is with us, he guides and protects us. Can you learn this verse together? # Family Activity 2

You will need: Music

Play a game of 'Musical Storms' – when the music plays everybody should dance and move around like they are being blown about in the storm. When the music stops, they should sit down as fast as they can like the ship crashing onto the land.



### Active Prayer

You will need: a piece of paper and pens. On one half of the page draw a picture of a storm cloud, on the other draw an anchor (or you can print the template on page 3).

Share together some of the things you have found most difficult in recent weeks and months. Write or draw these on or around the storm cloud. Around the anchor write or draw some of the things that have helped you feel connected to God and one another and secure in the middle of the storm.

Pray and ask God to decrease the things you have found difficult and increase the things that have been your anchors.

### Helping Older Children

Older children might be asking why God would allow the current virus to hurt people in the world. The Bible tells us that we live in a fallen world, that God did not intend for it to be like this. We might not always be able to see God in our circumstances, but He promises that He will never abandon us, He is always with us. Just like Paul we can trust God even in the middle of difficult times.







#### Discussion

#### A question for adults to ask children

What different ways that God helped Paul can you find in the story?

Paul had arrived in a strange place, God had already protected him and everybody on the boat during the shipwreck but He continued to look after and protect Paul. God sent people to look after Paul and the crew when they are arrived, he stopped him being poisoned by a snake and he used him to heal many people.

Being shipwrecked on an island might seem like a terrible thing to happen but with God on his side Paul turned it int a positive experience. Three months after his arrival when he set off again he had been given everything that was needed for the journey!

#### A question for children to ask adults

Can you think of a difficult time in your life which you now look back on as a good and positive learning experience?

# Family Activity 1

You will need: Colouring pens/pencils/crayons, a sheet of paper, a plate, scissors, string

Make your own swirly snake like the one in the story. Draw around a plate, try to find one that fills your whole sheet of paper. Cut a spiral from shape all the way to the middle of the circle. You could round off the head end to make it look more snake like.

Decorate the snake with any pattern you would like then add the string so that you can hang your snake up somewhere and watch it spiral in the breeze!



# A verse to remember / Prayer Activity

#### Mark 16 v 15-18

Jesus said to his followers, "Go everywhere in the world, and tell the Good News to everyone. Anyone who believes and is baptized will be saved, but anyone who does not believe will be punished.

And those who believe will be able to do these things as proof: They will use my name to force out demons. They will speak in new languages. They will pick up snakes and drink poison without being hurt. They will touch the sick, and the sick will be healed."

This passage comes from the book of Mark, one of the Gospels that tells the story of Jesus. How many of the things that Jesus promised can you find in the today's story about Paul in Malta? This is quite a long passage to try and learn so why not use it instead as a prayer wish list. Which of these things that Jesus said his followers would be able to do would you like to do?

# Family Activity 2

You will need: Pencils or sticks

Play a game of pick up sticks together, place the pencils or sticks in a pile and take it in turns to try and pick one up without letting any of the other sticks move. If one moves then your turn is up! If you manage to collect a stick without moving the others you get another go.

Who can collect the most sticks by the end?





# **Active Prayer**

Turn your game of pick up sticks into a "pick up prayer" – if you have coloured pencils why not give each a prayer topic or write the names of friends or family members onto the sticks you are using.

Why not find a map of the world and look for Malta together?

Take it in turns to close your eyes and point at a country then spend some time praying for the people and leaders of the country.



Pray especially for those who are suffering because of the Pandemic.

# Helping Older Children

Because the Bible contains so many stories of successful healings and miracles it can be difficult and frustrating to pray for healing in our own world and not see an instant miracle.

Romans 12:12 tells us "Be joyful because you have hope. Be patient when trouble comes, and pray at all times."

Remind children that these stories are there to bring us hope, that the God who performed miracles through people in the Bible is the same God we know today.

We may not understand why God does not respond instantly to prayers or why he does not immediately bring an end to this Pandemic but we can put our hope in God, wait patiently and continue to pray even in difficult times.
